Our children are our future. They are perhaps the greatest investment that an individual can make during their lifetime. From Genesis to Revelation the Scripture is replete with examples of the special place that children have in the heart of God and in the lives of His people. In fact children were a sign of blessing and favor from the Lord. That’s why in Biblical times women were shamed if they were unable to bear children (I Sam. 1:6-8 & Lk. 1:25). In the Psalms we read that children are the heritage of the Lord (Ps. 127).

Parenthood is a high calling and one that is shared with Our Father since He is the Father of all things. This is exemplified in the Gospels when Jesus rebuked the disciples from hindering the children to come to Him. He also used children on several occasions to illustrate His messages from the Father. Furthermore, Jesus could relate to them since He Himself was a Son. Likewise we can all relate to children in some manner since we all at one time were children.

Currently the country of Kenya is in a severe and dire crisis. Ever since 2006 Kenya and the surrounding countries in East Africa (otherwise known as the Horn of Africa) have been experiencing a drought. Moreover, the post-election violence of 2007 (which continued into 2008) only added to the severity of the food crisis in Kenya.

Because of the lack of rainfall rivers are drying up and electrical power is being rationed in the major cities of Kenya. Food prices have jumped nearly 130% in some regions especially in the Rift Valley region that is accountable for more than half of the country’s food supply. The current drought unfortunately played a factor in the failure of our

wheat project. With the continuance of the drought, and the slow but gradual recovery from ethnic violence, the children of Kenya are suffering the most.

Kenya officials have declared a state of emergency while the UN has appealed for millions in aid to help stem the food shortage. Up to 1.8 million children, due in part to the food crisis, are unable to attend school. 57% of school aged girls are likewise unable to attend school.

For the last several years OCM has strived to daily provide hot and nutritious meals for over 100 children (Prov. 19:17, Mk. 9:41-42, Jm. 1:27b). OCM strongly believes that the Gospel should be manifested in both deed and truth (I Jn. 3:18). A vital part of our OCM threefold vision (evangelism, education and economic relief) is ministering to ALL the needs of man.



Several years ago my father, the Founder and President, was led by the Lord to adopt two 2 year old twin girls that were the result of a rape. Their mother was only 14 years old at the time (look for this incredible story in an upcoming edition). Today Emily and Miriam are two gorgeous 10 year old girls that are a wonderful part of the Kinyanjui family.

Food for the Soul Blessed to be a Blessing (Gen. 12:3)



A part of the calling of the children of God is to become more and more like Him. As Adam was created in His image so were we created in His image when we received Him as Lord and Savior. In Genesis we

see the Creator blessing man and woman and they in turn were called to be a blessing to the world. In Hebrew culture and tradition the blessing was an integral part of life. Testimony from Pastor in Kenya

There is no such thing as a small service to children. A glass of juice, a plate of Muthokoi (Muthokoi is the one of the best Kenyan dishes), a fruit, even a cookie means so much to a child. Putting a smile on a little ones face is worth it all. OCM has not stood by and watched while these innocent little ones stagger helplessly and hopelessly. It may surprise many out there to know that providing a meal or two a week for some of these children rejoices the heart of our heavenly Father and provokes tears of joy to some desperate parents.

Janet and I, coming from a background very similar to most of these children take pleasure in ministering to them. We are thankful to Rev James and Esther Kinyanjui for offering us a chance to partake in the noble endeavors of Organization of Christian Ministries, Kenya.

A Story: Mary was barely two weeks old. The new joy of her parents; exposed to a hostile environment, this angel was attacked by Pneumonia and in less than twenty fours hours, baby Mary succumbed. I just buried Mary two hours ago. Mary Mother is a survivor. She is an example of many here who live on barely a dollar a day. Telling this mother to "go and be warm" and not attempting to empower her economically is like practicing dead religion. OCM is committed to going beyond spiritual enrichment.

This explains why I am proud to be associated with this organization. Kaptembwo is the largest slum in Nakuru city. Over 100,000 live here. It is a synonym of poverty and hopelessness in this city. Janet and I do not wish to minister in a nicer place. We say from the bottom of our hearts. Boys and Girls are giving us no rest asking for the recreational facility. The open field nest to our small 50 X 100 feet property is available at a sky –rocketing cost but we have not given up on it. Its is ideal for a children's recreational center. I see small kids soccer pitch at one corner, a vocational training center at another corner, a girls football pitch here, netball there, you name it!

We are indebted to friends out there who have given, are giving and who have yet to give to the worthy cause of this "on time ministry".
